Who's involved

Ages 14-16



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OBJECTIVE

To learn about all the people involved in a cyberbullying situation.

OUTCOME

To realize how many people are affected by the actions of a cyberbully.

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MATERIALS

Plain paper, pens or markers.

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Introduce the exercise to the class, and present the objective and outcome.
- 2. Get the students into groups of 3 (or individually if there is a small group).
- 3. Ask them to create a mind-map of all the people they think are involved in a cyberbullying situation. Allow them around 5 minutes to do this.
- 4. Come back together and ask each group for their answers. While each group is doing this, create a tally on a board to see if there is agreement between any or all of the groups (you can also do this if there are a few people who are working individually).
- 5. Discuss the people they have written and those who they have not included such as eggers, bystanders, parents or people online.
- 6. End the exercise by explaining to everyone that a lot of people become affected by the behavior of one cyberbully, so it causes a lot of worry for a lot of people and not just for the cyber victim. Also ensure that they are told they may not always know who is cyberbullying them.

EVALUATION

- Discuss any differences between the answers that each group gives.
- At the end, ask everyone how they think eggers, bystanders, parents and school staff may end up getting involved in a cyberbullying situation.
- Also ask how each character can potentially improve or worsen a cyberbullying situation.

NOTES

- Provide the following definition of an "egger" if some people do not know what it is: "A person who encourages a cyberbully to continue their behavior."
- Provide the following definition of a "bystander" if some people do not know what it is: "A person who watches or witnesses a situation without getting involved."
